My first teaching post was in the Royal School Dungannon. This is my second year teaching and I am enjoying the Art Department in Cookstown High School.




## MRS CATHERINE RUSHE

Pupils at CHS have once again achieved an outstanding set of A level results with 25% of the year group achieving 3A\* or A grades. As a combined grammar and secondary school, we are an inclusive community, where talents are nurtured and pupils are challenged to achieve their best grade possible.

Governors and staff are delighted that 53.6% of all grades achieved by pupils in

school were A\* or A while across Northern Ireland 44% of all grades were in that category. This kept Cookstown High pupils significantly above the Northern Ireland average for top grades. We are delighted that the vast majority of pupils have secured their first choice of university place.

The percentage of A\*-B grades is exceptional at 75%, demonstrating that the very strong work ethic of pupils and an application of very high



standards by staff, has ensured that CHS has a strong reputation for academic excellence. The number of pupils attaining A\*-C grades has increased again this year to 95%, while the overall A Level pass rate was 100%.

The success across subject areas is testament to the hard work and dedication of pupils and staff with over 50% of grades in Chemistry, Engineering, Health and Social care, Home Economics, ICT, Physics, Religious Studies,

Sport and Spanish being an A\* or A grade. In the vast majority of other subjects every grade was a B or better.

Pupils at Cookstown High School have once again achieved an outstanding set of GCSE results, 35% of all grades achieved were A\*or A grades, 13% of pupils achieved 9 straight A\* or A grades. We pride ourselves in providing our pupils with high quality teaching and learning coupled with high challenge and powerful support. 88.5% of pupils achieved % A\*-C grades, these results mean that the dreams and aspirations of our pupils have been realised.

Eight Departments achieved 100% A\*-C grades including Art and

Design, Biology, Chemistry, English Literature, Home Economics, Digital Technology, Further Maths and Physics.

Art

he Art department has had a busy year and abundant of skilful Artwork has been produced from year 8 right through to year 14 pupils. It has been lovely getting back to some form of reality and having key stage pupils back in the Art rooms. There have been many highlights to the year and the following is just a glimpse into the type of experiences and successes that the pupils have had.

This year we have a new member of staff joining the Art department, Miss Kerr. She has been a wonderful addition to the department and is skilled in Fine Art painting.

As key stage pupils could only use graphite media in their bubble rooms it was important for them to experience other art media. We started the year doing clay work with year 9 and 10 pupils. We are lucky at Cookstown High School to have two working kilns. The pupils loved working with clay, and it is a media that pupils of all abilities can enjoy and produce creative work. Year 8 focused on learning how to do watercolour painting and it this was a new experience for many of them.



As year 12 and A-Level pupils missed

out last school year in participating in workshops we organised a Fine Art Print artist Fionnuala O'Neill to Evita Baufaule come into the Art department to do an Intaglio print workshop with the pupils. This gave the pupils the opportunity to learn a new skill from professional artist and produce skilful prints for their coursework. This was an all-day session and there was a productive buzz in the Art room. Being creative and experimenting different disciplines is a focus of the GCSE and A-Level Art examination and from experience we have realised that the pupils gain greatly from working with professional artists and designers.

We encourage pupils to participate in any Art related extra- curricular activities be it in school or out of school. Mrs fields continued with her Photography Club every Friday at breaktime and there was a keen interest in this with the boys as digital art is becoming more popular, and it is an area that is developing fast within the Creative industries. Key stage pupils took part in two Art competitions the NI100 that was organised by the Department of Education and the Texaco Children's Art Competition. There was a great turnout of entries and fantastic Artwork was created. In the Art department we encourage pupils to participate in any local Art competitions as it develops the pupil's confidence in themselves and their work.

s Covid restrictions eased the **Shared Education Programme** was able to commence again with Holy Trinity College. Year 11 GCSE pupils took part in a Photography workshop where they learnt how to take a professional photograph and how to use new technologies such as 'Snapseed' to manipulate photographic images. Pupils had a field trip to Killymoon Castle where Mrs Coulter kindly let them take photographs inside and outside the castle in preparation for their workshop. In May the year 11 GCSE Art pupils also had a textile workshop in Holy Trinity College where they were taught contemporary textile techniques by local textile designer Andrea Hayes. Pupils developed new friendships and completed creative work that they will be using for their coursework.

Our annual A-Level Art trip had to be cancelled before Christmas due to Covid; however, this did not stop the pupils getting the chance to visit a local gallery and experience live artwork. We visited Gallery one in Cookstown where Jan Hagan gave the pupils a talk about the work in the gallery and the artists that they exhibited. History of Art is a part of the A-Level course and developing and appreciation of artwork is important in helping pupils develop their own work. The A-Level also completed a University of Ulster Outthe famous Northern Ireland artist Gerard Dillon and when they completed the course, they received a certificate from the University.

No matter the ability of the pupil, It's the Art department focus to provide all key stage pupils the opportunity to experience and develop their skills in all areas of art, design, and craft in preparation for future employment within the creative industries. Risk taking, thinking outside the box, working collaboratively are all important skills for the pupils to learn as well as developing their technical skills and knowledge.



We ended the school year with a Creative Curriculum Week where we completed Adobe Photoshop, sculpture, and clay workshops with KS3 pupils.

Our finest hour was however, was capitalising on the harsh winter weather by selling hand warmers. These sold out within days and we were left with substantial profits. It was an amazing learning experience for all of us involved.

Dear Mum and Dad,

8TH September, 1916

Life is unbearable! I'm writing to you from the trenches, they are so cramped you can't even sleep. The rats are so big that you would think they were cats! This is hell on earth. Why am I even here? Why does this have to happen? Why, just, why?

The trenches are awful. The mud is everywhere and you feel as if

it is going to suck you in! The Germans are not our only enemy - the mud is too! That's not the only thing you have to put up with. The sounds of war are frightening. The gun shots sound like a man blowing a whistle. We are bombarded with gun fire from every angle. The gas attacks are so bad. We fumble to get our masks on, just hoping that they will protect us from the snaking green gas. I watched a man dying from a gas attack. I felt so helpless. There was foam coming out of his mouth and he couldn't breathe. I couldn't help him. I was too late...

Going 'over the top' into No Man's Land is horrendous. It is like a

graveyard as bodies are lying everywhere. The battered trees are like skeletons. You have no idea what it is like here. I feel as if God has forgotten us. The battles are so awful. Gun shots ring out around you. The explosions are like storms. There is blood everywhere. My heart is constantly swirling as I feel so frightened all of the time. People are dying everywhere around me. Why? Why are we doing this? Why does no one listen to us? War is pointless. I wish I was at home in my bed! I wish I could be with you both. I miss you so much.

Dear Mum and Dad,

28TH October, 1918.

I have missed you greatly, I have no words to describe how much I wish I was there with you, happy under your protection, under your safe wings. Life in war is not what I imagined, it's hard here.

We live in these trenches where we suffer every day! They feel like a prison that I was sentenced to be in for what feels like an eternity. I feel trapped in here. I can't escape the horrors of war and even if I could, it would bring back memories that would haunt me forever.

There are rats everywhere! I go to sleep and wake up with one doing a dance routine on top of my body! I hate

them. I hate this place. I hate what war does to people. The living conditions are grim, but worse than that is the food! The food is rotten! I've never tasted prison food before but I imagine that this is worse.

I have a confession to make.... This pains me to tell you. I killed a man ...... Let me explain: I was in the middle of battle, all I could hear were piercing screams and the acute cries of soldiers dying around me. Every step had to be taken carefully as my life depended on it. I heard a noise and stopped. Death was everywhere around me. I felt numb. Suddenly I could see a gun pointing at me. It was either him or me. I was jolted out of my numbness and I fired a shot. Just one shot.

It could have been me..... I could have died. Please don't think badly of me, it takes my every effort just to survive.

I don't think I can take any more of this. I watched my best friend die. Can you imagine that? One minute he was standing beside me and the next he had fallen like a sack of potatoes to the ground. I held him in my arms and watched his life leave him. I felt helpless. Frightened. Angry.

I think of you both every day and miss you so much. I hope my letters don't upset you too much, but I need you to know what this horrible war does to people.

he History Department has been a hive of activity this academic year 2021/2022. There have been many events inside and outside of the classroom which have been enjoyable for pupils while also extending their understanding of, and interest in, the subject of History. Pupils across all year groups have had opportunities to take part in activities which developed their creativity, team work and critical thinking skills, as well deepening their subject knowledge. Here you will get just a taste of what has been taking place within the History Department this year.

### History Club

'he History Club has been running on Monday breaktime and is enthusiastically attended by budding historians from across all KS3 year groups. The activities taken part in this year include; History Guess Who?, Which One Doesn't Belong?, One This Day in History and a study of World War One including use of 'the trenches' set up in Room 30. In addition to this, pupils have been gathering evidence to include in a Time Capsule to celebrate the Northern Ireland Centenary. This Time Capsule will illustrate life for Cookstown High School pupils 100 years on since Northern Ireland's creation and will be placed into the ground beside a commemorative tree at a special event in June.

We were delighted to take part in a very exciting activity as part of our History Club meetings during this academic year 2021/2022. As part of the Northern Ireland Centenary celebrations the school requested a time capsule through the Department of Education. The time capsule project was part of the Department's NI100 Education Programme to mark the centenary of the establishment of Northern Ireland in 1921 and was developed by the Council for the Curriculum, Examinations & Assessment (CCEA) and Education Authority. In preparation for creating our own time capsule we used a number of our meetings to learn more about time capsules generally; time capsules from the past, different types of historical evidence, how to create a time capsule, what evidence to include and how to preserve the items included.

We wanted our time capsule to show what life is like in Cookstown High School in 2021/2022, 100 years on from the establishment of Northern Ireland. Therefore, the evidence we included gives a flavour of the clubs/ organisations in school as well as events and competitions which have taken place this year. Therefore, we included posters of the different clubs and fliers for key events, e.g. Spring Concert and Jubilee Celebrations, and competitions, e.g. ABP Angus Youth Challenge, STEM competitions and Super Curriculum Challenges. In addition, there is evidence included to show the academic life of school too.

In our school we have many different activities which take place and we wanted those who open the time capsule in years to come to be aware of how much we have on offer e.g. ICT Club, Photography Club, Science Club, choirs and music groups, and our very own History Club as well as many others. Sport is also a big part of life in Cookstown High School in this year as it has been over the many years of the school's history. We have hockey, netball, football, table tennis, athletics and cross country to name a few. We included posters for some of these sports as well as pictures of pupils who have had sporting success this year in a range of sports from athletics and hockey to judo etc.

September saw the celebration of the European Day of Languages.




Our dynamic team of expert linguists in Year 9 shared their passion for languages in Spanish.

The hills may have been alive with the sound of music, but the High School comes alive with the sound of bagpipes on Thursday afternoons.


This year, Pipe Band has been a little different to usual as we have not had external tuition; however, our own Mrs Blackwood and Mr Hamilton

# Concert Band ....end of an era

More years ago than I care to remember, I arrived at Cookstown High School as a newly qualified teacher and was keen to play a full part in the Music Department.

I quickly became involved in the various choirs, the recorder club and the samba band. It was within the Concert Band though that I felt most

confident and I eagerly took up the baton on the departure of my previous CL, Mrs Church. Whilst due to the replacement of classroom recorder tuition with more hearing-friendly keyboards the recorder group met its demise and we have not had a samba band running for several years, the Concert Band remained as a constant and many young players have passed through the ranks.

When the Music Service withdrew from brass tuition in CHS, the local Silver Bands stepped into the gap and alongside their thriving learner classes at the time we sustained a secure brass section along with our woodwind players and percussionists. For a variety of reasons (including the rise in popularity of 'solo' instruments such as guitar and ukulele and also perhaps due to the additional restrictions placed on musicians due to the Covid-19 Pandemic), we have seen the number of pupils having tuition on wind and brass instruments dwindle.



The dedication shown by the players we have had over the years has been second to none and it has been a privilege to watch them grow and develop both as musicians and as young adults. Many of them have continued their musical



endeavours as hobbies, with a considerable proportion taking music education to third level and beyond. Often we have had multiple members of the same family (and yes I have been here long enough for that to have spanned more than one generation). I am grateful for the influence these talented young instrumentalists have had on my teaching career and musical repertoire – who can performances which forget ranged as wide as 'The Magic Flute' to 'Gangnam Style' and 'Bohemian Rhapsody......

Several of our players will depart Year 14 this year, having completed seven years of unstinting service to the band (as even during restrictions, they were practising at home to learn parts for future performance). This dedication has enabled performances at the Carol Service and the Easter Service. We have always had

> support from staff who play instruments, and Mr Blackwood has been 'roped in' regularly to play the tuba; however, the current small numbers of woodwind and absence players of brass alongside an increase in the number of string players mean that the switch to a more sustainable Orchestra, under the baton of Mrs Gormley is the sensible thing to do.

I have been tremendously proud of our Concert Band during the period of my involvement and wish all the players well, wherever they may be (and I know that many of them continue to play). There was more than a touch of irony that our final piece, for the Spring Concert was an arrangement of Francesco Sartori's 'Time to Say Goodbye'.

#### **DEBATING SKILLS, IN RELIGIOUS STUDIES**

Developing good critical thinking skills is a huge part of the GCSE and A Level course in R.S. Students learn how to express their views, and justify them, whilst also being open to the view of others. This is key to success at examination level, but is also such an important skill for life in general. Many of the issues that the students discuss are topical and current in the world today.

"An infertile Christian couple should accept that they cannot have children." Do you agree or disagree? Give reasons for your answer, showing that you have considered different points of view.

No, I personally disagree with the statement, "An infertile Christian couple accept that they cannot have children" as God intended a husband and wife to have a family. In Genesis, God told Adam and Eve to have children so therefore an infertile Christian couple should be allowed to seek other ways to have a family, for example IVF. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights states that having children is a basic human right and no one should have to accept childlessness, even Christians. Paul told Christians to 'abide by the laws of the land', so as fertility treatment is legal, infertile Christians should not have to accept childlessness. There are also other ways for a Christian couple struggling with infertility to have a child, for example prayer. Hannah was a woman in the bible who desperately wanted a child and her response to the situation was prayer. God heard her and gave her a child, Samuel. An infertile Christian couple should not have to accept their childlessness, but should keep praying until God grants their request.

However, everything in our life happens as part of God's plan for us. God has a plan for everyone and it should be treated with respect. An infertile Christian couple should not take infertility matters into their own hands with IVF and surrogacy, but accept that infertility may be God's plan for them. A Christian couple

will also take into consideration their church's view on the matter. For example, if the couple are Catholic, the Catholic Church views IVF using donor egg or sperm, as bringing a third party into the relationship and is therefore mechanical adultery. A Christian couple should accept infertility as IVF goes against the sanctity of life. If they believe that life begins at conception, then they will disagree with IVF as many embryos are destroyed or tested upon. This will make it easier to accept that they can't have children.

Overall, I believe a Christian couple should not have to accept infertility, as it is not what God intended in marriage.

and is sacred too, so it should not be experimented upon as the process of experimentation kills the embryo. This may be seen as a violation of Commandment 6. In addition, God has a plan for every human life as it teaches that 'man is made in the image of God.' The life of an embryo should not be experimented upon or disposed of. The Hippocratic Oath sworn by doctors in the past, was a declaration to preserve life, but surely experimenting on embryos is destroying human life.

On the other hand, some people

may argue that God has given doctors their skills and that all means possible should be used to help extend and preserve life. If new medical treatments can be discovered through the use of experimentation, then surely this is a good thing. This could be seen as a way of following Jesus' command to 'love your neighbour', as these treatments could ease suffering and save many lives. Furthermore, some of the embryos that are experimented upon are left over from IVF – they are no longer wanted or needed and will be destroyed

anyway. Surely it is better to put them to a good use. Finally, they may believe that the life doesn't begin until the foetus can successfully live outside of the womb and therefore an embryo is not a life with any human right, but

is just a cluster of cells. If this view if taken, then there is no ethical dilemma with testing on embryos.

To conclude, those living with illness and in pain should be helped and if trialling treatments on embryos can

help, then they may believe it is morally right and acceptable to do so.

God her single focus in life. As she prayed about this, a great longing developed in her heart and she felt God was calling her to work in a place called The Democratic Republic of Congo. This was the beginning of her journey for God and she spent over 50 years dedicated to helping the people of Congo as a midwife and missionary. Since her retirement she has continued to return to the Congo and her latest trip was in 2022.






#### **REBECCA HAMILTON**


#### **HOLLY BROWN**

# Energe Project

ENERGE Project aims to promote Energy-Awareness amongst Staff and Students at Cookstown High School.

Cookstown High school is privileged to have been chosen as one of only two schools in Northern Ireland, and one of only thirteen across North-West Europe, to be part of the ENERGE Project. The other School selected to participate from Northern Ireland is St. Mark's, Warrenpoint.

The ENERGE Project is an interdisciplinary project involving academics from NUI Galway, Dublin City University and TU Delft in the Netherlands. The project has 4 main strands, namely: ascertaining students' attitudes behaviours and surrounding energy-usage at both home and school, developing educational activities and resources to improve energy literacy amongst students, monitoring and recording energy usage in schools and reducing energy consumption whilst improving student comfort.

The three-year project commenced in March 2020 just as the Covid-19 pandemic started to have a dramatic impact on almost every aspect of life, not least education. Using Microsoft Teams, Dr A. Morgan and the ENERGE Project students were able to complete the first task set for them by the researchers. This involved a lot of work on the part of the students who had



to monitor their home energy usage (electricity and home heating oil) over the course of a year.

In March 2021 staff and students were invited to a co-design session held over two-nights via Zoom with researchers in the Netherlands. This enabled students to build a model of their classroom and have their input into how the interface on the tablets would look and function. Dr Morgan wishes to thank both Miss R. Stewart and Mr N. Hastings who developed and trialled a number of ENERGE Project Activities with their Single Award Science Classes. Topics addressed including energy and electricity generation, and heat transfer.

Dr Edelle Doherty, of NUI Galway, visited the High School in person on 9th June 2021 to install four sensors in various locations used by students, including two classrooms, a Science laboratory and a communal area. These sensors constantly monitor the temperature, humidity, carbon dioxide level and ambient lighting level, with the sensor in the

communal area also monitoring the sound level. In conjunction with feedback from students via the tablets, it is hoped that the data from these sensors will eventually enable changes to be made to improve student comfort, for example, avoiding classrooms becoming too hot or the carbon dioxide level becoming too high which can lead to tiredness and decreased student engagement



during lessons.

The ENERGE Project students, accompanied by Dr Morgan and Miss Stewart, were invited to travel to the Cavan Crystal Hotel on 16th November 2021, where they participated in a variety of activities in person with students from St. Mark's, Warrenpoint, and the two ENERGE Project Schools from the Republic of Ireland. Other Schools from across North-West Europe joined via video-link. On 1st February 2022, Dr Nadine Roudil and Dr Antonella di Trani

(Sociologists with CNRS France) visited the High School to conduct research into how perceptions and attitudes energy surrounding usage varied between students via a number of one-to-one interviews. The researchers thanked the students for their participation and commented to staff how articulate our students' responses were in comparison to their peers previously interviewed in other ENERGE Project Schools in France and Germany.

Most recently, Dr Edelle Doherty visited the High School

CHS is privileged to have been chosen as one of only two schools in Northern Ireland, and one of only thirteen across North-West Europe on 17th June 2022 to install four tablets which will enable students and staff to interact on a daily basis with the data from the four ENERGE Project sensors. A television monitor was also presented to the School on which the live data will be displayed.

It is envisaged that the Project will enter into the final phase from September 2022 and it is expected to conclude in May 2023. This final phase will see Dr Doherty return to the High School to promote energyawareness beyond the ENERGE Project student committee to all staff and students at the School. This will involve a whole School assembly and new signage reminding staff and students to switch off lights and other appliances when not in use.

Students involved throughout the project to date include: Ella-Jane McCullough, Joseph Davidson, Louis Donnelly, Grace Harkness, Sarah Brown, Theo Thompson, Harry McQueen and Aaron Armstrong.

Dr Morgan wishes to thank and commend all of the above students, and their parents/carers, for their hard work throughout the project and to thank all members of staff who have helped in any way, including Miss G. Evans, Mr K. Rollins, Mrs C. Johnston, Miss R. Stewart and Mr. N. Hastings.








# JUNIOR SU

# Uhraine Appeal







n the 24th February 2022 Russian forces invaded Ukraine in protest to Ukraines growing independence and proposed threat to Russias supremacy. Within minutes of the "special military operation" being declared by President Putin of Russia, missiles and air strikes hit across Ukraine, including the capital Kyiv and large ground invasions from multiple directions. All this made headlines around the world, not only highlighting the tyranny of the Russian government but the thousands of innocent Ukrainian civilians who became collateral damage in President Putin's advance. In the weeks and months that followed, 6.5 million people are believed to have become homeless and displaced, fleeing to the bordering nations for safety, with a further 5.5 million also making the journey in fear of being Russias next target.

In response to the atrocity that was unfolding the world rallied in support of Ukraine providing much needed aid relief for those affected. In such a time of need the staff and pupils of Cookstown High School and the surrounding community came together to show their support for the victims of the conflict. We, the Senior Scripture Union issued an

appeal which went out on the the 1st March to the CHS community asking for donations to be made for various in-demand items for those crossing the borders to safety with little more than what they could carry in their arms. In the following days Cookstown High Schools pupils and staff displayed immense support and solidarity for the refugees of the war as an overwhelming stream towels, bedding, sleeping bags, clothes, shoes, toiletries, foods, medicines, bandages and many more items were brought into school and to the collection points. Within a matter of days, a once modest collection of toilet rolls and baby food turned into a carpet of critical and life saving supplies.

With a local collection point deadline at Cookstown Asda Carpark on the 5th March, all the donations were organised and sorted by the members of the Senior SU committee, along with some Year 12 and 14 subject classes, and many pupils gave up their break and lunch time to assist. Outstandingly, a cattle trailer was arranged to collect the aid on Friday afternoon and deliver the donations to the collection point on the Saturday Morning. The first donation was made in conjunction with Hope For Youth Ministries, a Northern Irish Christian organisation that

was taking a convoy of HGVs to the Polish border of Ukraine. A second donation was also provided to Cookstown Furniture Centre who had also put preparations in place to transport aid relief to the across the continent to the war struck region.

The immediate response of the CHS community was humbling and overwhelming as we all took to heart and into action, our strong Christian ethos to love and care for those less fortunate than ourselves, those who were and are experiencing immense hardship and cruelty.

As the Cookstown High School Senior Scripture Union, we would like to extend gratitude to all those who helped and supported the aid appeal. At the time of writing the war continues and the innocent people caught up in the conflict both in Ukraine, Russia and around the world remain in our thoughts and prayers.



# BALMORAL AND TV SUCCESS FOR ANNA MILLAR



This is Anna's story.....

I'd never owned any sheep until Christmas 2019 when I got a Valais Blacknose ewe and a ewe lamb. I saw them on TV and from that point on was totally obsessed! Consequently, I bought two more Valais Blacknose ewes in July 2020 and two further ewe lambs in August. My flock was expanded through embryo transfer work. Twenty-two embryos were retrieved and in March 2021, fourteen Valais Blacknose lambs were born. From never owning sheep before, to having my first lambing season eighteen months later with eighty-five lambs born, I was so proud of what I had achieved. The NI Valais Blacknose Club was formed in

August 2021 and I was asked to become part of the committee where I manage all the social media and advertising for the club. I thoroughly enjoy working in the committee, with other dedicated breeders, to try and promote this rare breed.

We approached Balmoral to showcase Valais Blacknose sheep where they were more than happy for us to showcase this rare breed. So, I jumped at this opportunity and entered a homebred ewe and ram lamb. The classes were very competitive but I came home with a first prize in the ewe lamb category and a third prize in the ram lamb category. Furthermore, my ewe lamb was selected to be one of the

group of three for the Interbreed Championships, where three sheep of the same breed compete as a trio against the other breeds at the Balmoral Show. We were placed in the top four out of twenty-two breeds, an achievement shared by all Valais Blacknose breeders!

I was approached by the BBC to be filmed for the Home Ground TV programme which was broadcast on Monday 16th May. The BBC filmed our journey with the Valais Blacknose and their debut at the Balmoral Show. This opportunity was too good to miss and proved to be such a valuable experience. I hope that the River Valais Flock continues to expand for many years to come!

The Super-Curriculum is a range of activities and experiences to extend the academic ability of pupils beyond the scope of their classwork. It is particularly important for pupils in Years 13 and 14, as a broad range of supercurricular experiences is key in securing access to the top universities in the country.

This was underlined when we welcomed James Davies-Warner, the Schools Liaison Officer from Corpus Christi College, Cambridge visited CHS in November 2021. He spoke with two groups of pupils: a group of Year 12 pupils and a group of Year 13 pupils. He outlined for them the entry process and criteria for application to Cambridge or Oxford and he answered questions the pupils had. He was delighted to hear about our super-curriculum activities in school and encouraged the pupils to get involved in their subjects at a deeper level beyond the classroom.





### Super Curiculum Challenges

In Term 1, three challenges were given to pupils in Junior School (Years 8-10), Middle School (Years 11 and 12) and Senior School (Years 13 and 14):

- Junior School Challenge: to write an essay on a current topic
- Middle School Challenge: to record a podcast no longer than 4 minutes on a current topic
- Senior School Challenge: to present a TED talk on a topic related on one of their A level subjects

The TED talk topics ranged from 'Should we fear AI?' to 'Should we ban animal testing for cosmetics and medicine?', with 'All sound is Music' and 'Modern art is not real art', 'Energy reduction is more important that green energy production' and 'We should stop using fossil fuels by this time next year', as well as 'If the Great War had not happened women would not have got the vote' and 'Should we legalise assisted suicide?'. The TED talks were presented to

Miss Evans and Mrs Gormley who were thoroughly impressed with the depth of research, knowledge shown and clear presentational skills.

All participants of the challenges have received a certificate and House points, as well as achievement points for their fine efforts.

### Letter from the Archive

The letter below was translated by the previous Principal of Cookstown High School Mr McNeill and Miss Acheson and documents the experience of a German Prisoner of War who was based in Cookstown.

"I Remember Especially Cookstown"

SO WRITES FORMER GERMAN P.O.W.

A letter addressed "To The Mayor, Cookstown, near Belfast, Ireland. Gt. Britain," was delivered to Mr. Joseph Allen, O.B.E., on Tuesday. On examination, Mr. Allen found it to be from one of the former German P.O.W.'s—Ernest Voss. Mr. Allen brought the letter to our office. Through arrangement with Mr. W. McNeill, BA., Head Master of Cookstown High School, and Miss M. Acheson, B.A., also of the High School, we have had the letter translated into English, which reads as follows: -

### Saturday 19th June 1948

I was amongst those prisoners of war, who in January, 1945, came into the P.W. Camp at Cookstown. The people of the place behaved favourably towards us and gave us a fair reception. By the summer of 1945 I left Cookstown, to go to Scotland to work. Then in Oct., 1946, I returned to Germany.

When I think back to the time when I was a P.W. in Gt. Britain, I remember especially Cookstown. I got to know the place through travelling to work at other camps and on marches. The then Commandant allowed us these as the evil war had not yet ended. For this we were especially thankful. I wish Cookstown and all her inhabitants a peaceful and prosperous development in the future.

I hope that other means than war and imprisonment will be used, so that people can get to know one another. Only an understanding between the peoples of Europe will be conducive to well-being and peace, for which we long so much. Please be good enough to send a post-card of Cookstown, so that I can show a picture to my family when I am telling them about Cookstown.
