Colin is a keen Bowler and as a founder member of Cookstown High School Bowling club he helped guide them to 3 Irish Club Championships as well as representing Ireland at both Indoor and Outdoor bowls. 

Along with this Mrs Fields established the 'Photography Club' which grabbed the attention of over 80 pupils. It encouraged pupils to go outside and explore life by looking through the lens of a camera. Not everyone enjoys drawing, so it was a fantastic opportunity for all pupils to get involved and create some digital Art. Pupils learnt new techniques, such as how to edit software and how to compose a perfect photograph.

Mrs McCausland organised the CHS Art Lock-down Competition for key stage three pupils. The theme was nature and there was a great response from many pupils. The winning entries not only received prizes, but their work was framed and is now on permanent display in the new pupil seating area in the upper building.

Art is all about thinking outside of the box, problem solving and independent learning. This school year has certainly helped our pupils to develop these skills within Art and Design. We focused mainly on the fundamentals of drawing and Art history and we are looking forward to having the pupils back in the Art rooms in the next school academic year to explore different artistic disciplines and media.

No remorse!


Avenged for his dead friend!



World Book Day


World Book Day took place this year on the Thursday 4th March and to mark the occasion there was a competition for all pupils in which they had to guess which teacher was hiding behind their books.

Our annual photography competition is always something we look forward to. This year we decided to use the lockdown as our inspiration. The idea was to share our experiences of lockdown, both positive and negative.


We always emphasise to our Geography students that we are not only citizens of Cookstown High School but also that we are global citizens.

DESIGNA RENEWABLE SHOPPING BAG YEAR 8

Plastic pollution has become one of the most pressing environmental issues as rapidly increasing production of disposable plastic products overwhelms the world's ability to deal with them. The convenience plastics offer, leads to a throw-away culture that reveals the material's dark side: today, single-use plastics accounts for 40 percent of the plastic produced every year.

Plastic is polluting every corner of the planet. It has found its way to the depths of our oceans, to remote forest paths, to the ice of the Arctic, and onto the island beaches where turtles nest. We don't know exactly how long oil-based plastic will take to degrade (or even if it ever will), but we do know that once it's in our soil, rivers, and oceans, it is impossible to clean up. The plastic we see washing up on shores and floating on the water's surface is only the tip of the trashberg. Over two-thirds of the plastic in our oceans ends up on the sea floor, creating an ever-growing wasteland beneath the waves. To make matters worse, bottles, bags, and other plastic rubbish gradually break into smaller and smaller pieces known as microplastics, which further damage ecosystems as they are invisible to the naked eye.

Where do we go from here? Short-term goals could include eliminating

unnecessary packaging that is difficult or impossible to recycle and expanding the use of reusable and refillable systems for transporting and storing goods. In the long term, we'll need to change our consumption habits.

Year 8 have designed reusable shopping bags to encourage people to ditch the plastic bags. Some even went the extra mile and got the sewing machines out to make their design. They are all brilliant!


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
A Level: NUTRITION & FOOD SCIENCE

YEAR 13

Pupils study a 'Diet, Lifestyle and Health' module in AS Nutrition & Food Science. In this unit, students explore current research on diet, lifestyle and health and investigate conditions such as cardiovascular disease, obesity, type 2 diabetes and cancer. Pupils have used ICT to present their research on the development of cancer and factors which influence an individual's cancer risk







FACTORS THAT PROMOTE THE DEVELOPMENT OF CANCER

Dietary fat

- Fatty foods can contribute to carcinogens such as ocrylamides, and are commonly generated in the cooking process. It is known that although it doesn't cause cancer it does promote the growth and progression when cancers have begun.
- It's vital that we ensure our ratio of omega 3 to omega 6 is correct. Often if we have a low ratio of omega 3 to omega 6 it is often linked to breast, colon and prostate cancer.
- Fat stimulates the production of bile salts in the gut. The bile salts are fermented by anaerobic bacteria in the colon to form mutagenic compounds. This leads to an increased risk of breast, colon and prostate cancer.



FACTORS THAT PROMOTE THE DEVELOPMENT OF CANCER

Salt

- Having high levels of salt in your diet may increase the risk of damage to the stomach lining and increase the sensitivity of the stomach to carcinogens, such as nitrates, which can then increase the risk of stomach cancer.
- The majority of the salt that we consume although we don't realise it, is already in the food that we eat as it is added during manufacturing.

 Therefore, it is vitally important that we don't add salt to the food we eat not only for our general health but also to reduce the risk of cancer.



FACTORS THAT PROMOTE CANCER

<u>Meat</u>

Nitrates and nitrites are added to processed meats such as:

Ham

Bacon

Sausages

This is often linked to colon and rectum cancer and individuals consuming MORE THAN 60 grams are at a HIGHER RISK.


YEAR 14

The A2 Nutrition & Food Science qualification involves studying a 'Food Security and Sustainability' module. In this unit, students examine consumer behaviour when making food purchasing decisions and consider the issues and implications of consumer food choice. Through inves-

tigating these issues, they should be able to outline the challenges to achieving food security such as climate change and severe weather, land degradation through intensive farming and population growth. Pupils have used ICT to present their research findings on these topics.

and Population Growth



Challenges to food security - due to Population Growth

The global population is rising – by 2050 it is estimated that there will be 9.2 billion people in the world. Therefore, it is estimated that we need to increase our food production by 70%.

Another global issued which can lead to food-insecurity is the food price spike. A convergence of factors has made food security one of the most important global issues. An increasing population want more varied diets, but is trying to grow more food on less land with limited access to water, all the time facing increased costs for fertilisers, fuel, for storage and transport.

ood Availability

More people; means more mouths to feed, greater demand for food and less to go around; therefore, more food insecurity in some places. If farming cannot produce enough crops, then food-insecurity will become a prevalent issue. Current farming techniques will not meet demands for food.

If climate Change continues as well as the growing population, people's access to food will be severely impacted. The overall prices of food will increase as will the demand. Therefore, meaning that low-income and vulnerable families will have inadequate access to food leading to food-insecurity.

Again, as population growth increases our food choices will be impacted, as will its desired use, which will put an increased pressure on food suppliers and food producers.

In 2050 the population will have increased by 2.7 billion. Most of this increase will be in Asia & Africa. They will face increased strain on already insufficient resources. Sustained population growth, aggressive economic competition and increased consumption will result in intensive exploitation and pressure on resources.

Sub-Sahara Africa have the highest population growth rate in the world. 1 in 4 people are undernourished leading to the country having the highest levels of food-insecurity and the lowest levels of agricultural productivity.

How population growth affects food sustainability:

- ➤ More people need more food
- ➤ Less land is available for agriculture
- > Increased demand for other resources e.g. fresh water, means less for agriculture
- > Increased wealth increases demand for more costly food commodities e.g. meat and dairy
- Human activity is increasing global warming and climate change which is reducing food security
- > Urbanisation, means fewer people involved in food production
- > Changes in population demographics and migration

FAITH IN ACTION by 9CA

In Year 9 Religious Education, the students have been learning about faith in action. They looked at Abraham as a biblical character of faith, before learning about William Wilberforce, and how he used his position as a Christian politician to bring an end to slavery across the British Empire. As part of this

topic the students completed a piece of research into a person of faith. They were free to choose someone who showed religious faith, faith in an invention or idea or faith in science. We hope that you enjoy reading the sample below of their excellent work.

Martin Luther King

In Hebrews Chapter 11 there is a list of bible characters who showed great faith. I want to write about someone in the 20th Century who showed great faith and his name was Martin Luther King. Articles and books written about him all say that he was one of America's most influential civil right activists. He was able to hold protests but these were peaceful in order to raise awareness of racial inequalities in America, something which was very close to his heart.

King was born in Atlanta on 15th January 1929. His father and grandfather were both Baptist pastors. He left school and went to study at Crozer Theological Seminary in Pennsylvania. At university he saw that there was great inequality and injustice faced by black Americans. He was hugely influenced by Gandhi who believed in getting results through non-violent protests.

At 24 he married Coretta Scott and soon after became a pastor in Alabama.

The Montgomery Bus Boycott was a turning point in his life because it became a turning point in the civil rights fight. He attracted much media attention at this time because he had a deep conviction about what was happening

to black people at this time. The boycott came about because a lady named Rosa Parks sat in a white area of the bus and refused to move. It is quite hard to believe that something like this would be tolerated in our modern world but in 1960'S America it was. In response King helped to organise a strike where coloured people refused to use any of the city buses. It lasted for several months and finally ended in the Supreme Court with a ruling that there was to be no more segregation on the buses.



Riding on this success, King and other ministers founded the Southern Christian Leadership Conference. However, some black groups around him did not share the same faith as King who continued to believe that non-violent protests were the answer, not force and violence. King was an outstanding speaker and was able to move his audience by the tone of his voice. He reg-

ularly shared about his own faith and the need to move forward peacefully. In 1963 he was named Man of the Year. It followed his famous "I have a dream Speech" during a Civil Rights March.

In 1964 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize and gave his prize money to the Civil Rights Movement.

Whenever the war in Vietnam broke out in 1955, King opposed it and this led to many politicians being worried about the influence he could have on the American people. They were not happy. King was harassed regularly by the FBI.

On 4 April 1968, Martin Luther King was fatally shot by James Earl Ray an American fugitive. King's family believed however that Ray was set up and they did not trust the findings of the FBI.

I believe Martin Luther King to have shown great faith in God, trusting him to use his words to speak to people and through these words changing the course of history for black people.



Virtual Science Club




This year Science Club had to go virtual!

It has been an engaging, rewarding and most enjoyable MFL lesson for our Year 8 and Year 9 pupils.









History



Rugby Taster Day

On Wednesday 23rd of June, as part of the Creative Curriculum, the High School held a Rugby Taster Day. During the day, boys and girls from Year 8 and Year 9 participated on the new 'state of the art' rugby pitch on site at the High School. It was hard to believe that this was the first time many of the pupils had played rugby, as the skills put on display were fantastic! Each session started with a few different drills allowing pupils to learn and practice a few fundamental skills of rugby such as running with a ball, scoring a try, catching and passing. Once pupils had their full arsenal of skills they were put to the test during a tag-rugby tournament. Tag-rugby is slightly different from full contact rugby: each pupil wears a belt with a tag attached to each side of the hip. If a player is carrying the ball and gets a tag removed from an opposing player this stimulates a tackle and a pass must be made. Pupils were split into

teams and battled with each other until there was one winning team. Each team had to quickly learn to work together effectively as they tried to score more tries than their opposing team. There were some exceptional individual performances during the tournament. Emilija Gribbin and Erika Gourley both put on the after burners, running down the wings to score a number of great tries. Calum Creighton and Adam Ferguson demonstrated that the best form of offence is a good defence! They both worked very hard to put in a number of crucial tackles for their teams.

Nick Griggs



Athletics, once again, has been greatly impacted by the COVID pandemic with no school's competitions taking place this year.

Despite this, I feel it would be very remiss of us here at CHS not to recognise the success of one of our athletes who has had fantastic success.

Year 12 pupil, Nick Griggs, our star track runner has been producing incredible results in his club races. He has not let a little old pandemic deter him from his desire to succeed and he has been very self-disciplined in keeping up his training during lockdown.

The last event that Nick was able to complete for Cookstown High School was the 'E' District Schools Cross Country Championships which were held in Necarne, Irvinestown. Nick won the Inter boys race convincingly and qualified for the Ulster Schools competition. Unfortunately, they were unable to hold the Ulster Schools competition due to the Pandemic.

Since then, Nick has only been able to take part in club competitions where he has had some great success. At the N.I./Ulster Indoor Track and Field Championships held in Dublin during the weekend of the 9th & 10th February 2020, Nick won the Under 17 800m in a time of 2mins 01secs. This meant he qualified for the All Ireland Championships which, unfortunately, were cancelled due to COVID.

On Sunday 16 March 2020, Nick won the Brackaville 5k road race over a hilly course in a time of 15mins 39secs - a fantastic time for a 15-year-old.

At the Mary Peter's Track on Saturday 15th August 2020, Nick came 2nd in the N.I./Ulster under 17 800m with a new Personal Best time of 2mins 0.05sec just losing out on the tape for the gold medal.

On Friday 12th September 2020, Nick competed again at the Mary Peters Track, this time in the Under 17 1500m race and once again won, with a new P.B. of 4mins 12.96sec, running his last 200m in an amazing 27 seconds.

On Saturday 8th May 2021, Nick competed in the North Belfast Harriers promotional event 'An Afternoon of 5k's' at the Mary Peters Track. Nick was running against a senior field and managed to finish in an incredible 6th position in a time of 14mins 15.98secs. This is over 20 seconds inside the Irish Under 20 qualifying time for the European Under 20 Championships.

Nick then went on to win a silver medal in the U20's 1500m race in Santry, Dublin on 20th June. Not only did he win silver, he also achieved a new PB of 3:53.54.

Not content with this, Nick competed in the U20 Irish Senior Championships in Santry, Dublin again the following weekend, this time winning the gold. He set a new Irish youth record of 8.11.15 for the 3000m. This breaks the Irish U18 record and the British U17 record for the 3K. This was also almost 12 secs inside the qualifying time for the European championships which will take place in Tallin, Estonia in July.

This has been an incredible season for Nick despite the pandemic and he should be immensely proud of his achievement. Hopefully next year, the COVID restrictions will have eased and we will be able to get all of our athletes back out on the track and field.

With any luck, the Districts, Ulster's and Irish School's competitions will all be in place again and we get to showcase more of our talented pupils on the Athletics field.



U20 European Champion

Since this article was written Nick has competed in the European U20 championships held where he won the gold medal in the 3000m. Nick was over a year younger than the next youngest competitor in the field but showed race management beyond his years to beat the best U20 athletes in Europe. He unlocked a final 2:31 km to run away from the field crossing the line in 8:17. We, at Cookstown High School, are delighted to have such a talented athlete in our school and we are so proud of his astonishing achievements this season.
