With roles of wire, power supplies and the odd improvised invention, Physics lessons were always applied and the content seen in action.

Helen's commitment to high-quality teaching has been unwavering. She supported and mentored colleagues with care, precision, and generosity, earning a reputation as a meticulous, hardworking, and deeply caring colleague. Her presence in the staffroom and classroom alike will be sorely missed.

Beyond science, Helen also shared her creative talents through a successful Needlework Club, where she nurtured pupils' skills and confidence in a different kind of craft — always giving freely of her time and energy to enrich school life.

As she steps into retirement, we thank Mrs Brooks for her extraordinary service, her passion for Physics, and her unwavering dedication to CHS. She leaves behind a legacy of excellence, kindness, and inspiration.

After twelve years of service, Cookstown High School bids a fond farewell to Mr Nathan Agnew as he leaves to take up the position of Head of Physics at The Royal School Armagh – his former school. Mr Agnew joined CHS in September 2012 as a Physics and Science teacher and quickly became a valued member of the Science Department. In recent years, he took on the role of Curriculum Leader for Physics, shaping the learning journey of countless pupils with his energy, clarity, and dedication.

Beyond the classroom, Mr Agnew made a lasting impact through his commitment to extra-curricular life. He played a central role in running the

Science Club for Year 8 and 9 pupils, where his memorable rocket experiments became legendary, sparking curiosity and excitement among younger students.

As House Leader of Drum, Mr Agnew was a constant source of enthusiasm and encouragement. His support on Sports Day – complete with a marquee, refreshments, and his signature oranges for Drum participants – epitomised his team spirit and dedication to pupil well-being. Mr Agnew also led pupil teams in the prestigious ABP Angus Youth Challenge, achieving remarkable success. Under his guidance, groups reached the semi-finals of the competition for five consecutive years, reached the finals twice, and notably secured a victory – winning 10 Angus calves for their efforts.

A gifted technician as well as teacher, Mr Agnew managed sound and lighting for many school events, including Spring Concerts and School Shows. His reliability and creativity behind the scenes, alongside his signature tradition of supplying sweets to his team, made him an indispensable part of CHS's performing arts productions.

His commitment to pupils' personal development extended further still. He helped organise and host the Journey2Where Bible exhibition for Year 10 pupils annually—an event that has become a valued feature of the school's spiritual life. He also faithfully supported and contributed

to the Junior Scripture Union during his time in CHS.

In his role supporting STEM enrichment, Mr Agnew organised and took part in a variety of trips and competitions, including the STEM Enthuse Partnership with Holy Trinity College – encouraging collaboration, innovation, and aspiration in STEM education across the local area.

Reflecting on his time in CHS, Mr Agnew shared: "I have really enjoyed my time

at Cookstown High School and am extremely sad to be leaving. I wish all the amazing staff and pupils every success for the future."

A Level Excellence at Cookstown **High School**

Cookstown High School is celebrating another superb year of A Level success, with pupils once again achieving results that reflect the school's strong tradition of academic excellence and high expectations.

This year's outcomes were extremely positive, with 37% of grades awarded at A or A* and 56% of all results at A-B*. These results ensure that the majority of pupils have secured their

first-choice university places, confirming the school's position above the Northern Ireland experienced by pupils. average for top grades.

Performance was strong across three A* or A grades: a broad range of subjects, with several departments achieving a 100% A-C pass rate*, including Art and Design, English Literature, Health and Social Care, • Grace Harkness – AAA History, Home Economics, ICT, ■ Theo Thompson – AAAB



Our annual Credit Union art competition brought out the best in pupils' creativity. We were thrilled




to have one of our talented pupils Jamie Ferguson year 10 achieved first place, a proud moment for the whole school community.





Pupils also visited Portballintrae, where they evaluated coastal management strategies, assessing how well the current defences protect the area from wave erosion. The day offered valuable insights into geomorphological processes and the challenges of sustainable coastal development.

GCSE - River Study with the Ballinderry River Trust Our GCSE geographers teamed up with the Ballinderry River Trust to conduct a river study along the Lissan Water. Pupils col-

lected data on channel width, depth, velocity, and sediment size at different points along the river's course. They developed fieldwork techniques and used scientific equipment to understand river processes like erosion, transportation, and deposition. This practical investigation supports their Rivers and Fieldwork enquiry units for GCSE exams.

These enriching experiences not only deepened pupils' understanding of geographical concepts but also nurtured teamwork, data analysis, and enquiry skills essential for future academic and professional success.

GEOGRAPHY CLUB

Geography Club: Big Quiz Fun and Games at Break Time!

The Geography Club has been a popular break-time destination for students eager to test their knowledge and have some fun. Pupils from across year groups gathered weekly to play geography-themed games, solve puzzles, and challenge each other on everything from world capitals to natural hazards. A highlight of the term was the Big Geography Quiz, expertly compiled by Year 14 student Adam Creevy. The quiz tested students' map skills, flags, famous landmarks, and current global issues. With prizes on offer and a lively atmosphere, the event was a huge success.

The Geography Club continues to be a fantastic way to learn in a relaxed setting and build friendships through a shared passion for the world around us.







Year 8 Geography Students Dig into Rubbish at Cookstown Amenity Site

Our Year 8 Geography students took learning out of the classroom and straight into the heart of Cookstown's waste management efforts with an eye-opening visit to the Cookstown Amenity Site. The trip focused on how human activity impacts the local environment—and what we can all do to help.

The tour began with a guided walk through the facility, where pupils saw exactly what happens to the different types of waste that we throw away at home. From glass and cardboard to electrical items and garden waste, the site workers explained how items are sorted, recycled, and safely disposed of. Students were surprised to learn that an average person in Northern Ireland produces over half a tonne of rubbish each year, much of which can be reused or recycled instead of ending up in landfill.



One of the highlights of the visit was seeing the recycling compactors and green waste shredders in action. Pupils watched as waste was transformed into material ready to be reused—turning what many see as "rubbish" into valuable resources. They also learned how landfill sites can pollute rivers and harm wildlife if waste isn't managed properly, linking closely to what they had studied

about river drainage basins and pollu-

During a Q&A session, site staff challenged pupils to think about their own habits. "What's one thing you can do differently this week to reduce your waste?" they asked. Pupils pledged everything from using reusable water bottles to separating plastics at home. Back at school, we discussed the most people don't realise that throwing a plastic bottle in the wrong bin could have such a big impact. It really made us think about how we can help the environment—just by being more careful with our rubbish."

The trip reminded everyone that looking after our planet starts with small actions at home—and sometimes it starts with a visit to the tip!







Year 9 Dive into River Studies with Speedwell Trust Project

This year, our Year 9 pupils took part in an exciting river study project led by the Speedwell Trust, combining classroom learning with hands-on fieldwork at Parkanaur Forest and the River Tor-

The project included three interactive classroom sessions, where pupils learned about river systems, the water cycle, and the causes and impacts of pollution on freshwater habitats. The sessions were packed with activities that helped pupils understand how rivers shape the landscape and why protecting them matters.

The highlight of the project was a field trip to the River Torrent at Parkanaur, where pupils became real geographers for the day. Working in small groups, they conducted a scientific river study, testing water quality, measuring the river's speed and depth, and identifying aquatic invertebrates. Using equipment like nets, magnifying glasses, and test



kits, pupils monitored signs of pollution and learned how water health affects the entire ecosystem.

One pupil said:

"It was brilliant getting into the river and checking the water quality ourselves. It made everything we learned in class feel real."

Pupil's applied their STEM skills in

a Water Wheels Challenge-designing and building working water wheels to show how river energy can be harnessed. This cross-curricular task helped them connect geography with engineering and environmental science in a creative, practical way.

The project not only boosted pupils' understanding of river environments, but also developed their teamwork, problem-solving, and critical thinking skills. It reinforced key topics in the geography curriculum, especially drainage basins, pollution, and sustainability.

A big thank you to the Speedwell Trust for running such an engaging and inspiring programme—and to Parkanaur for providing the perfect outdoor classroom!





CEMCOR FACTORY VISIT

Year 9 Students Go Behind the Scenes at Cemcor Cement Factory

In November, our Year 9 Geography pupils had the exciting opportunity to visit Cemcor Cement Factory, to discover what goes into making one of the most important building materials in the world-cement.

As part of their study of geology, pupils were given a guided tour of the factory floor, where they got to see the cement production process in action. From the quarrying of raw materials to the heated kilns and final grinding, students followed the journey of cement from rock to bag. The scale of the machinery left many amazed-particularly the giant trucks and raw material crushers, some nearly as big as a two-storey house!

Safety was a top priority on the visit. Pupils wore high-vis jackets, helmets, and protective eyewear as they explored different parts of the site. Factory staff explained how they monitor dust levels, reduce emissions, and recycle heat to make the production process more sustainable.

The trip wasn't just about machinery. Students also learned about careers in the cement industry, from engineering and maintenance to logistics, health and safety, and environmental monitoring. Workers shared their own career stories, giving pupils a sense of the range of skills and qualifications needed to work in a modern industrial setting.

A highlight for many was standing on the viewing platform above the massive rotary kiln-a huge, glowing tunnel where raw materials are heated to over 1,400°C. One pupil said: "I didn't realise how technical it was to make cement. There's so much science and engineering involved—it's not just dust and trucks!"

The visit helped pupils see how industry works in the real world-and that Cookstown isn't just home to cement, but to innovation, opportunity, and global-scale production.



TrailTalk Triumphs at Sentinus Young Innovators 2024


Cookstown High School Pupils Win Recognition for TrailTalk Tourism App

"Innovation, Inspiration, and Impact" - these were the words on lips as the TrailTalk team from Cookstown High School wowed judges and attendees alike at this year's Sentinus Young Innovators 2024, held in Belfast.

TrailTalk, a mobile app designed by a team of Year 10 pupils, earned top recognition in the Digital Innovation category, standing out among

entries from across Northern Ireland as the overall "Best Team Project". The app empowers users to explore local tourism through immersive, GPS-linked stories, images, and reviews – all created by other users. Whether you're hunting for hidden gems in your own town or planning an adventure abroad, TrailTalk is designed to help users discover unique places through community-driven







Team Meet the Behind TrailTalk

The success of TrailTalk was driven by the creativity, technical skill, and entrepreneurial spirit of five pupils from Year 10:

- Luke Johnston
- Karla Kasperaviciute

Each team member brought their own strengths to the project, from coding and content creation to branding, marketing, and user interface design. Together, they collaborated over several weeks to build, refine, and pitch their app to a panel of experts - all while managing schoolwork and extra-curricular commitments.

A Vision Born in the Classroom

What began as a creative idea in a STEM workshop quickly transformed into a fully-formed business concept. The team of pupils, working under the guidance of staff from the ICT department and in partnership with Cookstown Enterprise Centre and

categorise their content (e.g., historic, scenic, foodie, hidden gems). It also includes features like user ratings, accessibility info, and the ability to create themed walking routes. The pupils showed a strong understanding of both technical and commercial elements, including a detailed plan for future development, mone-



Nigel Eccles (NY Tech entrepreneur), took part in several entrepreneurship and sessions before pitching their idea at the regional competition.

Their concept was simple but powerful: combine storytelling, maps, and personal recommendations into a platform that travellers and locals alike could use. The app lets users tag locations, add short video or written stories, and tisation strategies through sponsorship and affiliate links, and ideas for educational tieins with schools and tourism

Judges Impressed by Real-World Thinking

The judges praised the team not only for their creativity but for their professional-level pitch, clear understanding of the user journey, and commitment to real-world problem-solving. One judge commented:

"TrailTalk has the potential to impact how local tourism is shared and experienced. The pupils demonstrated confidence, market awareness, and outstanding teamwork - all while remaining rooted in their local community."

The team also impressed with their infographic visualisations, a fully working prototype of the app, and a display board that highlighted user experience, accessibility, and the app's potential to grow globally. They even showcased a revenue model flowchart and a growth projection graph to back up their pitch.

More Than Just a Project The TrailTalk journey has not only earned the pupils awards - it has also opened doors. Team members have been invited to apply for the Sentinus STEM Youth Board, attend Catalyst innovation sessions in Belfast, and connect with local businesses and developers for potential app sponsorships and mentoring.

Behind the scenes, the project has also been a shining example of collaboration between education and enterprise. With support from the Cookstown Enterprise Centre and the inspiring input from mentors like Mr Eccles, the TrailTalk team has proven that young people, given the right support, can build solutions

with real potential. Looking Ahead

This success is just the beginning. The team would like to refine TrailTalk further, with the opportunity of potentially partnering with local councils and tourism organisations.

TrailTalk has shown what's possible when pupils combine creativity, technology, and a passion for problem-solving. As one team member said:

"We just wanted to make something useful - something that helps people explore the world around them. Winning at Young Innovators was amazing, but we're even more excited about what might come next."

A Proud Moment for Cookstown High School Mr Johnston, Head of ICT and STEM Coordinator, expressed pride in the team's efforts:

"These pupils showed outstanding commitment and maturity throughout the project. Their success at Sentinus is well deserved, and I believe TrailTalk is a project that could genuinely evolve beyond the classroom. It's proof that our pupils are capable of real innovation."

STEM Outreach Project 2024/2025

Inspiring the Next Generation of **Innovators**

This academic year, the Cookstown Enterprise STEM Outreach Project continued to go from strength to strength, sparking curiosity and inspiring innovation in classrooms across Mid-Ulster. Now in its latest phase, the project delivered a series of engaging STEM workshops to local primary schools-bringing real-world engineering challenges to life and building the skills of both pupils and mentors alike.

Workshops Across Our Community



Throughout 2024/2025, our STEM Ambassador team-led by Mr Robert Johnston from Cookstown High School-visited a number of local primary schools including:

- Moneymore Primary School
- Churchtown Primary School
- Cookstown Primary School
- Phoenix Integrated Primary School
- Stewartstown Primary School
- Ballytrea Primary School

Each visit brought hands-on excitement, teamwork, and challenges that stretched the minds of budding young engineers from Primary 5 to 7.

What the Project Involved

The workshops were designed to introduce pupils to core STEM principles-especially structural engineeringthrough a range of fun, practical tasks. Activities included the Paper Strength Challenge and the Straw Tower Engineering Task, where pupils tested their creativity, resilience, and problem-solving abilities.

Under the guidance of CHS mentors, pupils learned how to design and construct structures, test their strength, and refine their ideas—all while working collaboratively in teams. These real-world tasks brought classroom theory to life and provided an early glimpse into the kind of thinking needed for careers in engineering, design, and technology.

Primary Pupils Rising to the Challenge

The response from the participating schools was outstanding. Pupils displayed strong communication, critical thinking, and design skills, often exceeding expectations with their innovative solutions and attention to detail. From carefully balanced towers to record-breaking weight-bearing structures, their achievements reflected not only creativity, but a real understanding of STEM principles.

Many teachers commented on how their pupils thrived in the team-based, hands-on for-

mat-highlighting how these workshops helped uncover previously unseen talents in design, leadership, and logical reasoning.

Royal British Legion National Youth Standard Bearer

Congratulations to Year 13 student Rebecca Bell, who has once again been awarded the prestigious title of Royal British Legion National Youth Standard Bearer—for the second consecutive year. Rebecca retained her title on 6 April 2025, after achieving first place at the national final in Stockport, confirming her position as the leading Youth Standard Bearer in the United Kingdom.

Rebecca's journey to national recognition is a testament to her dedication, discipline, and unwavering respect for remembrance. Over the past year, she has represented Cookstown and Northern Ireland at numerous high-profile events and competitions, regularly carrying the Northern Ireland Youth Standard with pride and distinction.



Her remarkable year began in September 2024 with a memorial service for Sir Clive Johnstone at St Margaret's Church, Westminster Abbey. Later that month, she claimed first place in the Youth category at the Group 7 Standard Bearers Competition in Loughbrickland, Banbridge, and proudly carried the NI Youth Standard at the War Memorial Rededication in Moy.

October brought further success: Rebecca was crowned Youth Champion for both Northern Ireland and Ireland at the NI & ROI Standard Bearer Competition in Cookstown. She went on to represent Northern Ireland at the Poppy Appeal Launch in Belfast, the RBL Strabane Centenary Drumhead Service, and the Festival of Remembrance at Belfast's Waterfront Hall, all while continuing to support local remembrance events, including the Field of Remembrance at Belfast City Hall and the Tesco Poppy

Appeal Collection in Cookstown.

In November, she travelled to London for the Festival of Remembrance at the Royal Albert Hall, taking part in two nationally broadcast performances. On Remembrance Sunday, she proudly paraded with her father and grandfather to the Cenotaph at Whitehall, honouring three generations of dedication to service and remembrance.

In the new year, Rebecca received her official trophy for her NI Youth win and was formally presented



with the NI Youth Standard at the NI Conference in Ballymena. In March, she carried the Standard in the Portadown St Patrick's Day Parade, and in April, she achieved her most significant accolade: winning the RBL National Youth Standard Bearer Competition in Stockport.

Since her national victory, Rebecca has continued to represent the Royal British Legion with distinction. She carried the Standard at the RBL Cookstown Centenary Festival of Remembrance, attended the RBL National Conference in Harrogate (17 May), participated in the NI Armed Forces Day in Newtownards (21 June), and supported the Randalstown Branch 100th Anniversary Parade and Drumhead Service (22 June).

Rebecca's success is not only a personal achievement but also a reflection of her strong character and commitment to honouring those who have served. She is an outstanding role model and ambassador for her school and community. Few musicals have captured the grit and heart of Vicroian Londond with such falir and pathos as Oliver! and few school productions have tackled it with such energy, commitment, and flair as this year's remarkable performance.

Oliver! is, of course, based on Charles Dickens' 1837–39 novel Oliver Twist, and retains much of the book's biting social commentary – poverty, injustice, and the perils of the workhouse – while transforming it into something vivid, tuneful, and deeply human. Lionel Bart's 1960 stage adaptation remains a landmark in British musical theatre, being one of the first to bring the grimy underworld of London's East End to life through song and dance. While Dickens

gave us the characters, Bart gave them unforgettable voices.

As in the novel, the story follows young Oliver, an orphan born into hardship, who dares to ask for "more" and sets off on a journey through a world of exploitative adults, ragtag thieves, and a few surprising allies. From the sinister charm of Fagin to the brutal menace of Bill Sikes, and the tragic nobility of Nancy, the characters remain as compelling today as they were nearly two centuries ago.

Our 2024 production honoured this rich legacy while bringing a fresh, youthful energy to the piece. The students navigated the show's demanding emotional range with impressive maturity – from

the cheeky camaraderie of "Consider Yourself" to the heartbreaking tenderness of "As Long As He Needs Me." The ensemble shone throughout, giving voice to the voiceless street urchins and underclass that Dickens championed.

Of course, the original Oliver! story is fiction, and does not claim to be based on real events. However,


Dickens' novel drew heavily on the real conditions of London's poor in the 19th century – child labour, crime, and the rigid social structures that made escape from poverty nearly impossible.

In Dickens' time, the orphan Oliver Twist's survival and defiance offered readers hope. In our time, this production has done much the same – reminding us that kindness, courage, and compassion remain our best defences against cruelty and indifference.

As Lionel Bart once said: "A musical should rise above the spoken word." This year, our students

made it soar.





Over 70 pupils took part in the production, either on stage, behind the scenes, or in the orchestra, bringing Charles Dickens' beloved tale of poverty, perseverance, and found family to life in the Millar Hall. For three consecutive nights, audiences were transported to the grimy backstreets of Victorian London.

At the heart of the story was Luke Johnston, whose portrayal of the orphaned Oliver Twist was filled with quiet strength and heart. Louis Donnelly was mesmerising as the crafty Fagin, bringing a perfect balance of menace, humour, and warmth to the role. The audience was equally charmed


by Rory Harkness as the cheeky and ever-confident Artful Dodger, who led the ensemble with swagger and skill

Looking Ahead



SKI TRIP 2025



"FROM FIRST TURNS TO SUMMIT RUNS" - A WEEK TO REMEMBER!"

In January 2025, 49 pupils and 5 staff from Cookstown High School set off on a once-in-a-lifetime adventure to the stunning ski resort of Pinzolo, located in the heart of the Italian Dolomites. The eight-day trip was packed with new experiences, personal achievement, and plenty of fun - both on and off the slopes. For many, it was a journey of firsts: their first time skiing, first flight, and first taste of authentic Italian pizza!

Day-by-Day Highlights

Day 1 – Touchdown in Italy

After an early morning departure from school and a smooth flight into Verona, excitement built as we travelled through the Italian countryside toward the mountains. As snow-capped peaks came into view, pupils got their first real sense of what lay ahead. On arrival in Pinzolo, we collected ski gear, settled into our hotel, and got a briefing ahead of lessons starting the next day.

Day 5 - Back on the This trip wasn't just about skiing. Pupils discovered new


strengths, stepped out of comfort zones, supported each other, and embraced a different culture. It was about learning, laughing, and creating memories that will last lifetime.

IN MEMORY OF MR WILFRID YOUNG, OBE, MA, DIP ED HEADMASTER OF COOKSTOWN HIGH SCHOOL (1971–1990)



We are deeply saddened to learn of the passing of Mr Wilfrid Young, OBE, former Headmaster of Cookstown High School, who led the school with distinction from 1971 until his retirement in 1990. Mr Young, who would have celebrated his 98th birthday this year, leaves behind a legacy of scholarship, service, and steadfast dedication to education.

An erudite and gracious gentleman, Mr Young was known for his warmth, wisdom, and unwavering commitment to the development of young people. His love for the local area was matched only by his deep affection for Cookstown High School, where he played a pivotal role in shaping the school's direction during a period of significant change.

During his 19-year tenure, Mr Young oversaw the amalgamation of the former Grammar and Secondary Schools, steered a major building and renovation programme, and introduced the then-new GCSE system. Under his leadership, the school evolved to meet the needs of a changing educational landscape, all while retaining a strong academic foundation and community spirit.

Mr Young's scholarship was remarkable. A passionate classicist, he had a lifelong love of Latin, Greek, classical literature, and ancient history. His guiding philosophy might well be captured by the phrase "ancora imparo" – "I am still learning." Even in later years, he remained intellectually curious and engaged with the world around him

Educated at Foyle College, Londonderry (1941–1946), Mr Young went on to study at Magee University College, Trinity College Dublin, and Queen's University Belfast. At Trinity, he graduated with Honours in English and French and earned multiple prizes and scholarships throughout his academic career. He served as Assistant Lecturer in English at Trinity College and later as Lecturer at Magee College, before being appointed Head of English at Rainey Endowed School, Magherafelt, in

In 1971, Mr Young became Headmaster of Cookstown High School. He was a diligent and expert educator, respected for his high expectations, deep subject knowledge, and diplomatic leadership. Known for his quiet dignity and approachable nature, he was a trusted mentor to both students and staff alike, always ready to listen, advise, and encourage.

In recognition of his outstanding service to education, Mr Young was awarded the OBE in 1987 – an honour he received with characteristic humility.

Beyond his educational contributions, Mr Young was an active and faithful member of the Church of Ireland. He served on both the Armagh Synod and the General Synod, and in 2006, he was honoured with the title of Lay Canon at the Cathedral: a fitting tribute to his commitment to faith and community.

Mr Young was a loyal and beloved figure in the life of the school – not only a Headmaster, but a mentor, advocate, and friend to many. His impact on the lives of pupils and colleagues alike is enduring, and his memory will be cherished by all who had the privilege of knowing him.

We extend our deepest sympathies to Mr Young's family. Cookstown High School has lost a true scholar and gentleman. We are grateful for the years he devoted to our school and proud to honour his memory.
